FMCA National Director Report

from Sharon, FMCA National Director

As members of FMCA as well as GMC Western States, we members benefit when that organization prospers as well as we ourselves do. FYI, here is a summary of the report from the FMCA National Treasurer based on financials in August:



Overall, revenue is up \$891,177 over this time in fiscal year 2017. Membership dues are up \$342,569. Membership commissions are up a staggering \$342,523 as well. Overall, events income was up \$409,529. One concern on the revenue side is advertising sales. They are down \$160,213 from this time last year. Expenses are up \$132,016 from last year. On the membership side, the big item continues to be FMCAssist. As we know, the 2018 fiscal year rate came in well over what we had budgeted. That caused some issues on our financials. We paid \$309,690 more this year than last year. If you take out that expenditure, we have actually done better on the expense side, while also increasing revenue. Subsequent to their initial billing, the insurer did an internal audit and found some charges had been made to our account that should not have been made. On their own, they re-billed us for the correct lower amount and that will show up as significant savings for us in future years.

The big saver was on the events side. We spent \$346,461 less than last year.

Also of interest is this quote from the Executive Director's Report about FMCA membership figures: "Membership finished fiscal year 2018 with a gain of 3,612 members. Our year-end figure of 77,519 is a 4.9% gain for the year. Since the beginning of fiscal year 2017, we have gained 7,270 members, which equates to a gain of 10.2%. We have added just shy of 3,000 families who own RVs other than motorhomes. That segment now makes up 3.8% of our membership total."

So we in GMCWS can be proud that there has been this much recovery from the down time about a decade ago when the parent organization's finances were looking bleak, when the whole motorhome industry was on its lips. To know more about why FMCA is important to you and our club, read your magazine closely and notice all the offered benefits - while you are enjoying the pretty pictures!

GMCWS is part of the International Area (INTO) of FMCA. Should you be on the east coast in October, you could join that rally at Myrtle Beach. However, we plan to be at our own GMCWS rally at Seven Feathers Casino next October in Oregon. Another rally of interest to us on the west coast is the

2018 was a good year for GMCWS. We enjoyed a joint rally with GMCMI in the Spring -auction income defrayed extra costs - and expenses for our Fall rally at Mt. Hood were covered by attendees' fees. In 2018 we invested in logo apparel, 2019 rally deposits, communications to members, the annual roster, and media consultation. GMCWS's account at the beginning of 2018 was \$22,822. After accounting for club income (gifts, dues, donations and sales) and expenses as noted above, the balance in our account as of December 31, 2018 was \$20,869.



Chula Vista - The Early Days

Born in Chula Vista in

1938, I missed the Indian settlements 7,000 years earlier, the founding of the city in 1911, and the 39 inches of rainfall over 2 months which occurred in 1916 causing the failures of both the Sweetwater Lake and Otay Lakes Dam, killing 50 and filling the end of San Diego Bay with silt, which persists to this day. (Annual rainfall nowadays is around 9 inches). The Sweetwater River now trickles just north of the RV Park. Lower Otay Lake is now the U.S. Olympic Training Center.



But, the little town of around 20,000 back then was a great place to grow up as a free-range kid. It had been the largest lemon growing area in the world in the early 1900's and I grew up amidst acres of the trees. Riding bikes out to Otay lakes to fish for Bluegill using huge worms from under the chicken barns at the Nichols Chicken Ranch where I worked, and maybe doing Snipe hunts with unsuspecting younger kids along the way, was fun. Then there was Grunion hunting on the Silver Strand, when the tides were right at night, cuddling around a campfire with your sweetie while waiting for them to arrive.

The San Diego and Arizona Eastern Railroad, built by J.D Spreckles of sugar fame, traveled by F Street School, where I attended, and down 3rd Avenue on its way east to El Centro. My neighbor, Mr. Carnahan, was a fireman on the steam train and one time the train stopped and he invited me to join the crew in the engine for a short ride down 3rd to my street. How could a 11year old ever forget that!

The area east of my home near Hilltop Drive was completely open wild land for miles.

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Chula Vista - The Early Days

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In High School, we'd drive our jeeps out for "war games" which mostly consisted of playing "hide and seek" with camouflaged vehicles. The day I bought my jeep I drove out into the wild to "test it out" giving my mom, who came along, a scare she never forgot. The next day I awoke to 4 flat tires. Driving over cactus wasn't one of my best moves. The jeep was the vehicle of choice to travel into Mexico and camp on wild beaches now polluted with thousands of condominiums.



Wartimes brought big changes. Rohr Aircraft located west of what is now I5 and produced engine mountings for the B24 bombers made by Ford in Detroit. The Hercules Powder Plant had produced cordite for the British in WWI on Gunpowder Point, now a wildlife refuge. Chula Vista grew astronomically and uncontrollably starting in the 1960's to a city of 300,000 today, the second largest in San Diego County, the expansion initially settled by returning military and wartime industry workers. I had left by then to attend college. All the lemon trees and open space are gone. It's not the place I remember and I'm just sorry that other youngsters won't be able to have those wonderful experiences I had growing up in the area.

Black Bean Salad Recipe

- 2 cans black beans, drained, about 30 ounces
- 1 (15-ounce) can corn, drained
- 2 Roma tomatoes, diced
- 1/4 cup diced red bell pepper
- 1/4 cup diced red onion
- 1/4 cup diced green onions
- 1/4 cup diced pineapple
- 1 tablespoon chopped cilantro leaves
- 1 jalapeno, seeded and minced (optional)
- 1/4 cup sherry vinegar or rice vinegar
- Juice of 1/2 lime
- 3 tablespoons honey
- Pinch ground cumin
- Salt and pepper to taste

Mix all ingredients in a bowl and refrigerate for one hour. Best if refrigerated overnight.



Message from your President

Our GMC community is a diverse one. To highlight that diversity, we want to acknowledge differences in how our members celebrate their faiths. This article spotlights Buddhism and the celebrations of its beliefs throughout the year.

Buddhist Observances

We Buddhists do not celebrate “the holidays” as in the Christian faith. However, we live a life of Nembutsu, which means we live everyday with gratitude. Therefore, there is no need to designate special days. The Buddhist tradition has developed special observances that focus our attention on historic events and important Buddhist practices that deepen our appreciation of our rich cultural heritage.

January 1st – New Year’s Day. In Buddhist tradition, each moment is a new beginning. However, New Year’s Day is celebrated to renew our resolution to live with Nembutsu gratitude. This is a very quiet time for visiting with families and enjoying the new year feasts prepared by our mothers, grandmothers, aunts and sisters.

January 16th – Shinran Shonin’s Memorial Day (Hoonko). This is a service in memory of Shinran Shonin (May 21, 1173 – January 16, 1262), the founder of Jodo Shinshu sect, of which I am a member through the San Mateo Buddhist Temple. Shinran Shonin is buried in Nishi Hongwanji, Kyoto, Japan. In 1994 Nishi Hongwan-ji was listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site as one of the Historic Monuments of Ancient Kyoto .

A statue of Shinran Shonin stands in Upper West Side Manhattan, in front of the New York Buddhist Church. Although this kind of statue is often found at Jodō Shinshū temples, this particular statue is notable because it survived the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, standing a little more than a mile from ground zero. It was brought to New York in 1955. The plaque calls the statue "a testimonial to the atomic bomb devastation and a symbol of lasting hope for world peace."

February 15th – Nirvana Day. On this day we observe the passing of Sakyamuni Buddha – or simply the Buddha – the actual person who attained Buddhahood. He was a monk, sage and teacher on whose teachings Buddhism was founded. He is believed to have lived and taught mostly in the northeastern part of ancient India sometime between the 6th and 4th centuries BC. Even with his death, he taught us the impermanence of all existence.

March & September Higan – Spring and Fall Equinox Days. Higan means “the Other Shore”. We hold a service in the spring and fall on or about the equinox. During this time, the world seems in balance, the weather is temperate, and the days and nights are of equal length. We are encouraged to sense the constant change and oneness of all existence. In seeking harmony within ourselves, we practice the Six Paramita: Giving, Discipline, Patience, Endeavor, Meditation, and Wisdom.

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Buddhist Observances

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April 8 – Buddha’s Birthday (Hanamatsuri). This service commemorates the birth of Prince Siddhartha Gautama, the historical Sakyamuni Buddha. For this service a flower shrine (Hanamido) is set up to symbolize the place of his birth. The Sangha (our temple members) pours sweet tea over the image of the infant Buddha, depicting the sweet rain that fell rejoicing his birth.

May 21 – Shinran Shonin’s Birthday (Gotan-e). Gotan-e is the day we observe the birthday of Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu. He was born near Kyoto, Japan, on May 21, 1173.

July-August – Obon. Obon is a Buddhist Memorial Day, an occasion for rejoicing in the enlightenment assured by the Buddha. It is often referred to as a “Gathering of Joy.” Obon dancing expresses joy and gratitude for the Dharma (the teachings of Buddha). In Japan, it is celebrated by welcoming the ancestors back to earth; we go to the cemeteries and clean our ancestor’s grave sites, and offer incense and flowers. The families prepare special feasts, we participate in Obon dance, dancing around in a huge circle, often wearing our Japanese summer kimono, also known as Yukata, and dancing many traditional Japanese dances.

September 1 – BCA Founding Day. September 1, 1899, marks the official establishment of Jodo Shinshu (Buddhist Churches of America, BCA) in the mainland United States. This is the sect that my family belongs to.

October – November – Perpetual Memorial Service (Eitaikyo). Eitaikyo means the perpetual chanting of the sutra. This annual service is held in memory of temple members who have passed away and then registered by family members for this service. My mother registered our father and I registered her when she passed away, and my sister and my sons join me at temple to offer our thanks to them.

December 8th – Bodhi Day. On this day, 566 B.C.E., Siddhartha Gautama attained enlightenment under the Bodhi Tree and became the Sakyamuni Buddha. At our temple, we have a live Bodhi Tree in a planter that we bring inside the Hondo and celebrate Bodhi Day. Our dedicated members take good care of this tree for all to enjoy. The actual Bodhi Tree still lives in Bodh Gaya, Bihar, India.

December 31 – New Year’s Eve (Joya-e). On New Year’s Eve, we meditate on the countless kindnesses and compassion received throughout the year and to express our gratitude to Amida Buddha and to all sentient beings.

For the new year, I wish to extend my gratitude for my family, relatives and friends throughout this country and overseas. We wish you all a healthy and prosperous New Year and safe travels in your GMC, even if you have to travel in your own vehicle because the GMC is out of commission. Just go with the flow. See you at the GMC Western States in Chula Vista - come join the ukulele jam session and learn the hula. Bring your tropical wear!
